

EMERGENCY GAS SHUT-OFF

To be fully prepared for an emergency, you should know how to shut off the natural gas service to your home. The following are examples of emergencies; however, it is not a comprehensive list:

- Fire in structure or near the meter
- Earthquakes with enough magnitude to displace equipment
- Floods
- Wind damage
- Carbon monoxide symptoms
- Gas odors

If an emergency occurs, but **YOU DO NOT EXPERIENCE FLU-LIKE SYMPTOMS OR SMELL OR HEAR ESCAPING GAS, THEN YOU PROBABLY DO NOT NEED TO SHUT OFF YOUR GAS.** Doing so may deprive you of service unnecessarily.

However, **IF YOU ARE EXPERIENCING FLU-LIKE SYMPTOMS, ARE IN DOUBT, OR SMELL OR HEAR ESCAPING GAS,** then:

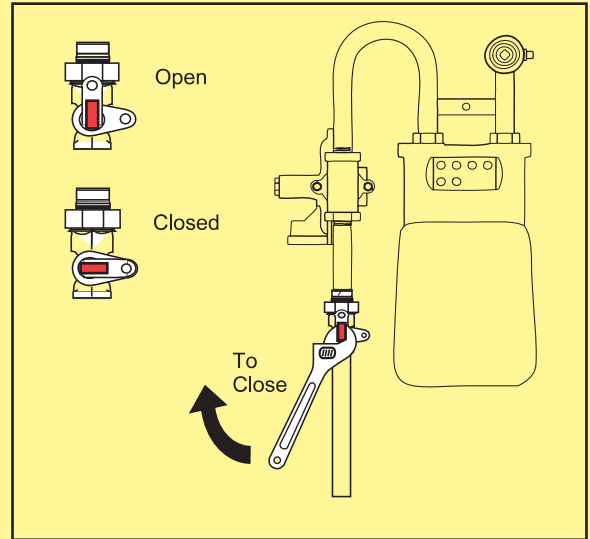
DO NOT:

- Turn any electrical switches on or off.
- Smoke, use the telephone, or take any other action that might create sparks.
- Return for personal items.

DO:

- Leave the house.
- From a remote location, call Intermountain Gas at 1-877-777-7442 or call emergency responders at 911.
- At your discretion, **shut off the gas meter** following the instructions on reverse side.
- Once the gas is off, **LEAVE IT OFF** until an Intermountain Gas Company Service Representative can check out the system. The equipment will be checked by a technician, who can ensure that the system is intact and operable.

HOW TO SHUT OFF A GAS METER



- Locate the meter shut-off valve (usually the first fitting) on the gas supply pipe coming out of the ground.
- Use a long handled wrench to turn the valve one-quarter turn so that the lever is crosswise to the pipe (see diagram).
- Once the lever is off, **LEAVE IT OFF** until a qualified Intermountain Gas Company Service Representative can check out the system.
