



EMERGENCY GAS SHUT OFF

If an emergency occurs, but you do not experience flu-like symptoms or smell or hear leaking gas, then you probably do not need to shut off your gas. Doing so may interrupt your service unnecessarily.

However, if you are experiencing flu-like symptoms without a fever, are in doubt or smell or hear leaking gas:

DO NOT:

- ▶ Switch anything on or off, such as lights, electrical switches, garage door openers or vehicles
- ▶ Use e-cigarettes, smoke, lighters, matches or other open flames
- ▶ Use a telephone of any type, including cell phones
- ▶ Stay indoors or return for personal items

DO:

- ▶ Immediately leave the house or building
- ▶ From a safe location, call Intermountain Gas at **800-548-3679** and call **911**
- ▶ If it is safe to do so, shut off the gas meter following the instructions on the other side of this card
- ▶ Once the gas is off, for your safety, leave it off until a Intermountain Gas technician can check out the system to ensure it is safe and operable before turning it back on

To be fully prepared for an emergency, know where your gas meter is located and how to shut off the natural gas service to your home.

The following are some examples of emergencies:

- Fire in the home or near the meter
- Earthquakes with enough magnitude to displace equipment
- Floods
- Wind damage
- Carbon monoxide poisoning (flu-like symptoms)
- Gas odors

HOW TO SHUT OFF A GAS METER



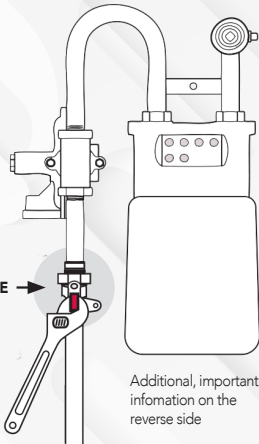
OPEN

Additional, important
information on the
reverse side

- ▶ Locate the meter shut-off valve (pictured) on the gas supply pipe coming out of the ground.
- ▶ Use a long-handled wrench to turn the valve clockwise a quarter turn so that the lever is perpendicular to the pipe (see diagram).
- ▶ Once the valve is off, **LEAVE IT OFF** until a qualified Intermountain Gas technician can check out the system.
